Dear Friends

I was speaking to someone recently about the season of advent and the celebrations that we enjoy at the church and we had a laugh about the story not really changing much; in fact there would be a bit of an outcry if I tried to alter it.

It set me thinking about what it is that we do and say and sing about in the church throughout the year. In truth, our whole year is set in the rhythm of Advent, Christmas, Lent, Easter, Pentecost, a summer lull and then Harvest and back round we go to Advent again.

I couldn't have Christmas services at Easter or a Harvest service during Lent. It wouldn't make sense. And yet are we not just repeating the same story again and again?



The answer in truth is yes, we are celebrating the coming of a King, the birth in Bethlehem, the life of the preacher and miracle-worker, His journey to Jerusalem, His death and His resurrection. And we do this every year. There is comfort in this familiar heartbeat of the Christian faith, a predictability in what we will do, the songs we will sing and even the bible passages that we will read.

So why do we do it? Are we just continuously living in the past? What new thing can we say about any of these events?

If we were purely looking at historical events and reliving them each year, then it could become tedious and mundane. But the truth is that we have a living, breathing faith. Yes – Advent, Christmas and all the other festivals are important in grounding ourselves in what we believe. But what is more important than singing Love came down at Christmas, or O Come all ye faithful is that we can have a relationship with God because of the babe in the manger.

Each day we walk with the saviour of the world, our daily lives matter to Him. The substance of the story never changes but our relationship with Jesus grows and develops as we mature in the faith.

So this year when you think about Christmas, if you come to any of the services, or if you are hearing the familiar carols being played as you do your Christmas shop. Think about the real Jesus, the one who was born in a manger, and who grew up and lived and died and rose again and then sent the Holy Spirit, so that you can know God. So that you can have a relationship with Him and so that you can write your own story of everyday life with Jesus by your side.

Every blessing over the Christmas Season and best wishes for 2026.

One Year of Hope

Early Intervention Mentoring Project

Just over a year ago, Aberdeen North Church took a step of faith alongside our neighbouring churches—Sheddocksley Baptist and Northfield United Free—to launch something new and deeply hopeful: an Early Intervention Mentoring Project.

Through a partnership with Transforming Lives for Good (TLG), volunteers from our congregations have been going into Westpark Primary each week to mentor children who need a bit of extra care and encouragement. What began as a small idea—a simple hour of one-to-one time each week—has become vital for the pupils involved.

Last month, we gathered with our partner churches to celebrate the project's first anniversary. The service was led by Jo McIllwane, TLG's Church Relationships Lead for Scotland, who shared stories of how Early Intervention is changing lives.

Jo explained how the programme works: "Each church gathers a small team of volunteers, led by a coordinator, who are trained to mentor one child for an hour every week, over the course of a year. That consistent hour can make a remarkable difference—not just to the child, but to families, teachers, and the wider community."

We've certainly seen that ripple effect locally. Our mentors are not only supporting children but also building relationships with school staff, families, and one another.

Hope and encouragement are quietly spreading through the school, the homes of those involved and our own congregations.

One of our volunteers, Annette Grieve, shared her experience of mentoring: "I was a bit nervous at first—I wondered if I'd connect with the child—but from the start, there was a bond. We do crafts, play games, chat about life... it's been such a joy. I'd encourage anyone with a heart for children to get involved."

It's stories like Annette's that remind us what can happen when we simply show up, week after week. Faithfulness—one hour at a time—becomes friendship, trust, and transformation.

Reflecting on the journey, Rev. Fiona Lister, our minister, said: "It's been wonderful to see what can happen when churches work together. The Early Intervention Project has strengthened our bonds with one another and with our community. It doesn't take a huge commitment from each person, but collectively, it's making a big difference."



From the beginning, collaboration has been at the heart of this initiative. We've been grateful for the partnership and prayers shared across congregations, which has helped shape and sustain the project from day one.

As we mark the first anniversary, we at Aberdeen North Church give thanks for all that's been achieved. This project has reminded us that the love of Christ takes shape in the simplest of ways: through a conversation, a moment of listening, or an hour spent helping a child believe in their own worth.

Together with our friends and partners, we look forward to another year of hope and possibility. Because when God's people step out in faith—one hour, one child, one conversation at a time—lives are changed, and communities are renewed.
